Kenny Hall and the Santa Fe Rambiers Born blind on October 14, 1923 in San Jose, California, now residing in Fresno, Kenny Hall is a master mandolinist and fiddler in old-time music styles (southeastern rural U.S.), music from other parts of the U.S., Ireland, Mexico, Latin America, and many parts of Europe. An energetic and passionate performer, Kenny has also been an inspiration to hundreds of musicians from around the world. A Kenny Hall program is one of world rhythms, stories and folk songs. Members of Heartland Harvest, along with his wife Marta (on the bodhran) round off the line up of the Santa Fe Ramblers.

Roberto Rodriguez, PhD, is a research associate at the Mexican American Studies and Research Center at the University of Arizona. He is a longtime award winning journalist/columnist. Many of his awards have come about in the area of defense of the First Amendment and Human Rights. His interest in research that developed persuant to his column writing concerns origins and migration stories of Indiginous people of the Americas. (continued)

Dr. Rodriguez' current field of study is maize culture, migration and the role of stories and oral traditions among Mexican and Central American Peoples. He is involved in creating Indiginous Studies within the discipline of Mexican/Chicana/o Studies. His work, based on a serious of interviews with Indiginous elders throughout the continent, has resulted in several documentaries, including: Amoxtli San Ce Tojuan - We Are One (2005). He continues to write a nationally syndicated column. He is the author of "Justice: A Question of Race". In 2003, he and wife Patrisia Gonzales were named Distinguished Community Scholars at UCLA's César E. Chávez Department of Chicana and Chicano Studies.

The Raging Grannies perform topical songs you will be tempted to sing along to! Please do! The Raging Grannies (or just "Raging Grannies") are activist organizations that started in Victoria, British Colombia, over the winter of 1986/87. There are now groups in many cities and towns in different countries. They are social justice activists, all women old enough to be grandmothers, who dress up in clothes that mock stereotypes of older women, and sing songs at protests. They typically write the songs themselves, putting their political messages to the tunes of well known songs. **The Fresno Raging Grannies** made their inaugural appearance at the annual Women's International League for Peace and Freedom Crafts Faire on December 3, 2005.

3:00 pm

Cindy Sheehan is an anti-war activist. Her son, Casey, was killed in the Iraq War in 2004. She is a co-founder of Gold Star Families for Peace. She attracted international attention in Aug. 2005 for her extended demonstration at a camp outside President Bush's Texas ranch. Dubbed "Peace Mom" (which is also the title of one of five books she has authored or co-authored), she then moved her protests to Washington, D.C., where she was arrested at a demonstration outside the White House in Sept. 2005, and again in Jan. 2006 after displaying an anti-war slogan while attending President Bush's State of the Union Address; the charges were dropped the next day.

In July 2007, she announced that she would run against Speaker Nancy Pelosi in California. She qualified for the ballot in Aug. 2008 as an independent candidate. She did her best to drive a wedge between Pelosi and the anti-war Left, making an issue in particular of Pelosi's decision to continue funding the Iraq War and her refusal to pursue the impeachment of President Bush. She finished second to Pelosi in the Nov. 2008 election.
